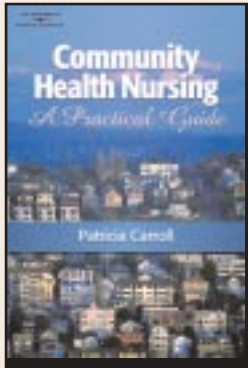


Community Health Nursing: A Practical Guide

This book is an outline of the key concepts of community health nursing. It includes important concepts such as populations as a unit of service, populations at risk, and the new concerns of terrorism and bioterrorism.

The author has identified two purposes for this book. The first is to serve as a handbook for undergraduate baccalaureate students in place of a traditional textbook. The second is to serve as a review in preparation for the NCLEX, or as a review for students who did not have community health nursing in their curriculum.

It is written for undergraduate nursing students or new practitioners in the area of community health nursing. It is written at an appropriate level of understanding.

The book covers the important content areas of community health nursing, including the concepts of population as the unit of service, community assessment, epidemiology, and care of vulnerable populations. The inclusion of the modern concepts of terrorism and bioterrorism make the book timely. The use of multiple choice questions and critical-thinking questions encourages students to think and hopefully increases knowledge retention. The Web sites are a very useful supplement.

The book is very well written identifying the most important community health nursing content in an outline format.
